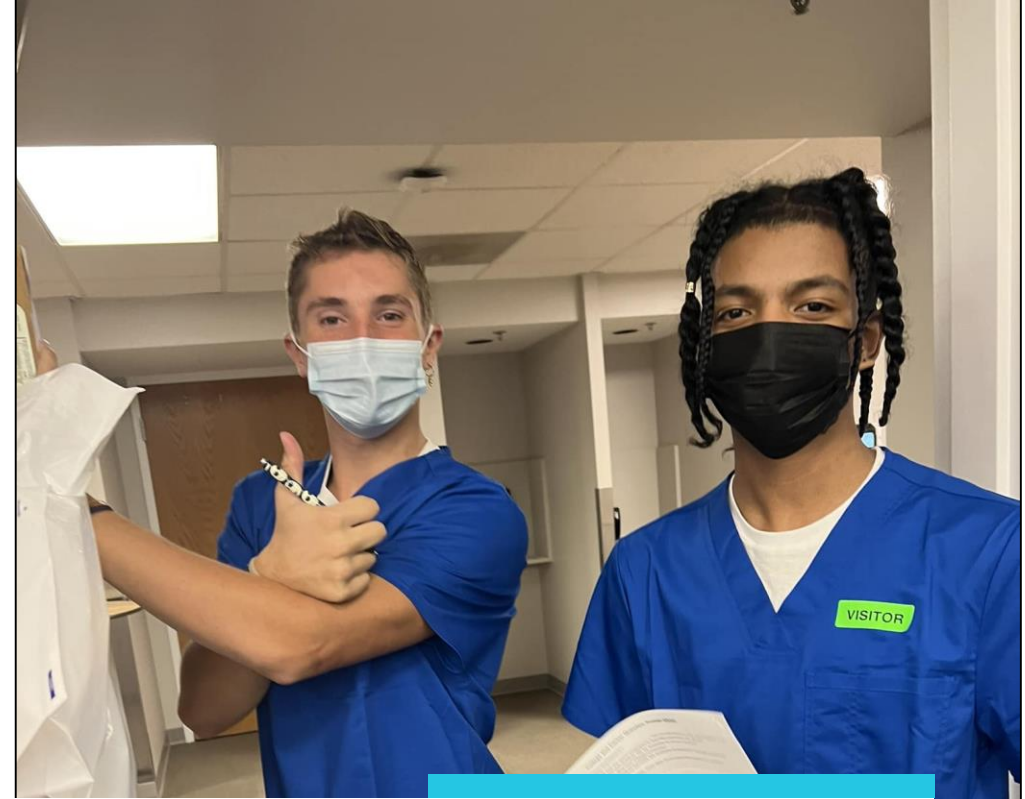
What is Career and Technical Education (CTE)?

CTE prepares secondary, postsecondary, and adult students with technical, academic, and employability skills for success in the workplace and in further education.

- Idea for Stephenson Area Career Center (SACC) began in late 1960s
- SACC later became Stephenson Area Vocational Technical Education System (SAVTES) in 1987
- SAVTES changed name to CareerTEC – the Career and Technical Education Consortium – on July 1, 1999

Overview

- Serve H.S. juniors and seniors from 6 school districts and 7 local high schools
 - Dakota, Durand, Freeport, Orangeville, Pearl City, Pecatonica, and Aquin Central Catholic
- EFE #220 is one of 56 Education for Employment regions in Illinois.
- Programs would be too costly for most high schools to pay alone; thus, share cost
 - Funding: 57% local, 34% state, 8% federal, 1% families

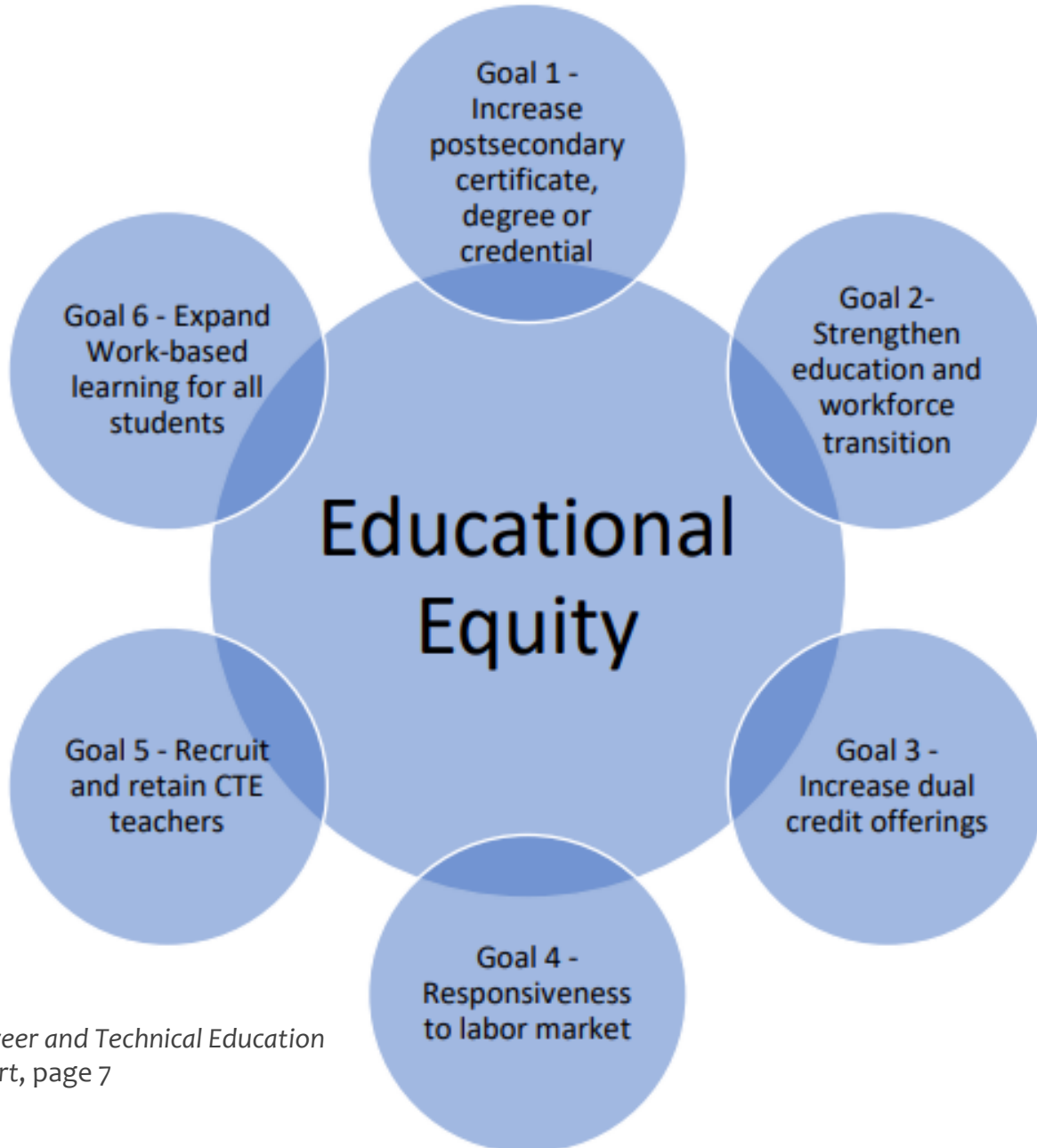


CAREERTEC

Goals

- Prepare students for two- and four-year colleges, entry-level jobs, and/or technical schools
 - 75% of all CTE learners enroll in postsecondary education after high school (www.careertech.org)
- Students learn “soft skills” such as punctuality, critical thinking, and problem solving, communication skills
- Give students the opportunity to explore careers

Illinois State Board of Education Equity Focus and State Goals



1. Increase postsecondary certificate, degree or credential
2. Strengthen education and workforce transition
3. Increase dual credit offerings
4. Responsiveness to labor market
5. Recruit and retain CTE teachers
6. Expand work-based learning for all students

As a parent, what would I want to know about CareerTEC?

Benefits to my son/daughter?

- Earn high school AND dual credit from Highland Community College for 10 of our 15 programs
- Network with people in the career field through job shadows, field trips, work-based learning opportunities, and/or clinical experiences
- Achieve Industry credentials
- Meet students from other schools
- Acquire life-long skills even if you don't go into that career
- Build your future résumé with a foundation of knowledge and technical skills
- Community service
- Explore career options

Will he/she be safe?

- Safety is a priority from day one. Instruction includes how to use classroom tools and equipment safely
- Learn from excellent, experienced teachers that have actually worked in that career cluster
- Each school busses students to Freeport. For most schools, busses drop students off at Freeport H.S. and another bus then will take your son or daughter to his or her class site.
 - Check with your local high school if they allow students to drive to CareerTEC.
- School discipline expectations extend to CareerTEC. Any issues are reported to the home school and parents/guardians.

What will be my cost?

- Your local high school pays the tuition to attend CareerTEC
- There are some fees for families that cover things such as lab, tools, textbook, uniform, and registration fees, and they are subject to change.
 - If you are unable to pay these fees, you can apply through your home school for a waiver. Applications for a waiver must be completed and submitted during registration at your home school.
- Hope you agree it's better to spend a little bit of money and time now to determine if a career is right for your son or daughter rather than spend a lot of money and time later and learn it's not a good fit

- All 15 programs in Freeport
 - St. John United Church of Christ, Highland College, Freeport High School, and construction sites
- Highland College calendar vs. CareerTEC calendar
 - Most HCC classes meet 4 days a week
 - Expectation that students attend CareerTEC classes even if their home school is not in session
- All programs offer 2 years of study
- Board of Control = Superintendents

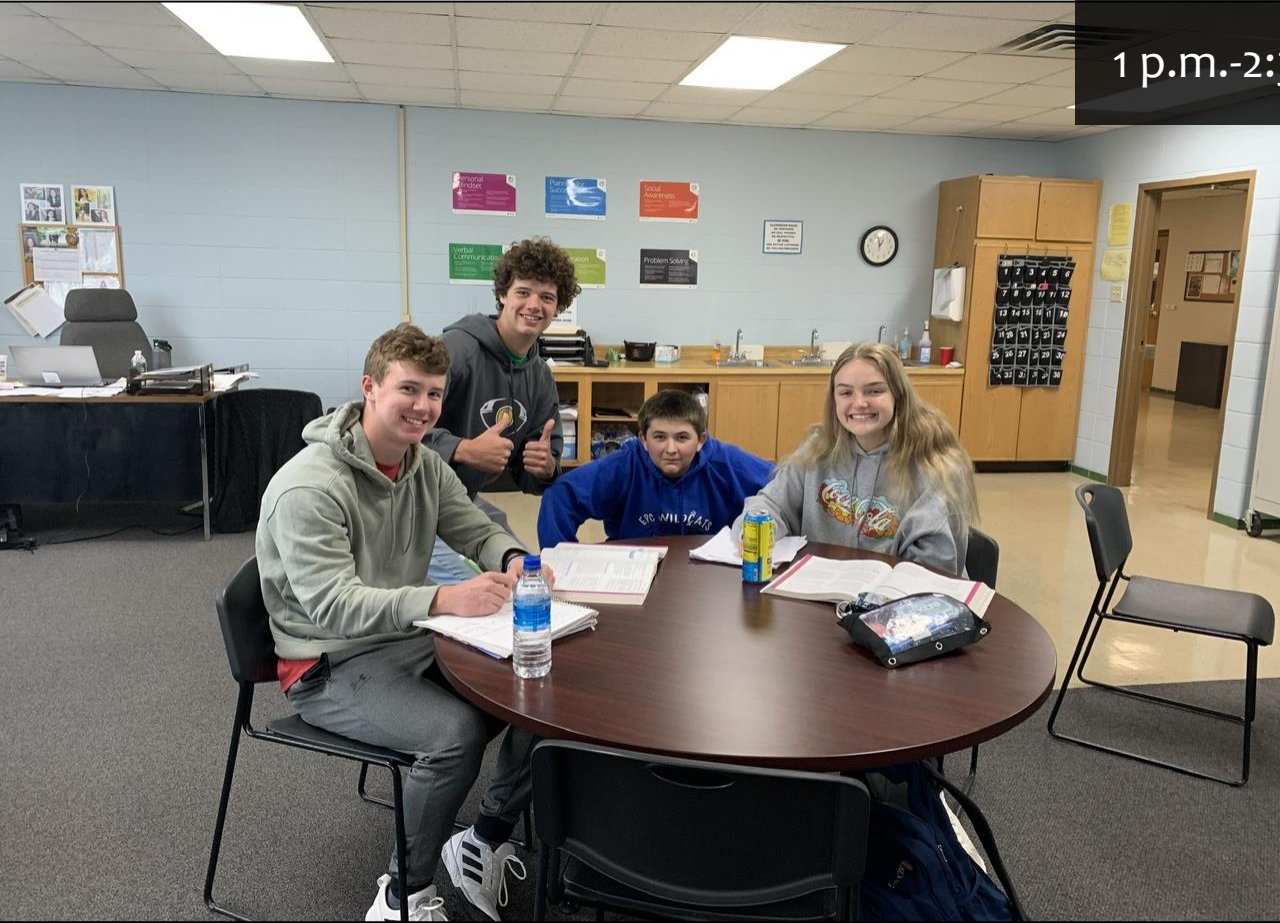

 - Dual credit: 3 hours (3 in Year 2)



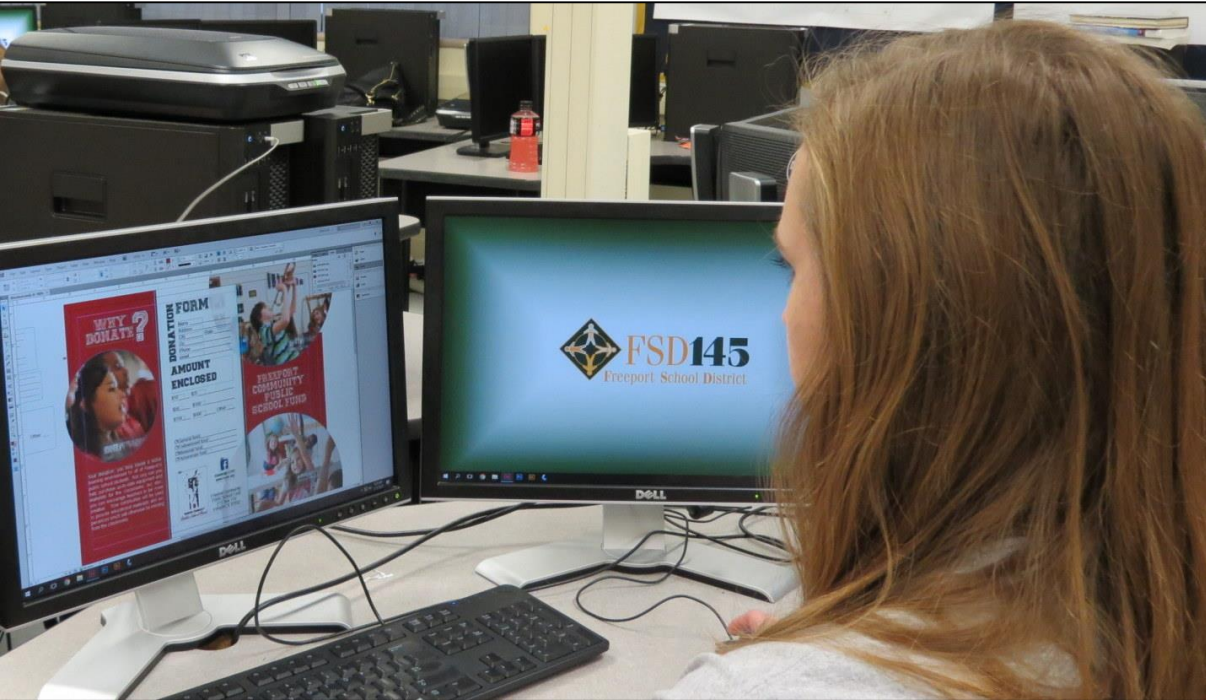

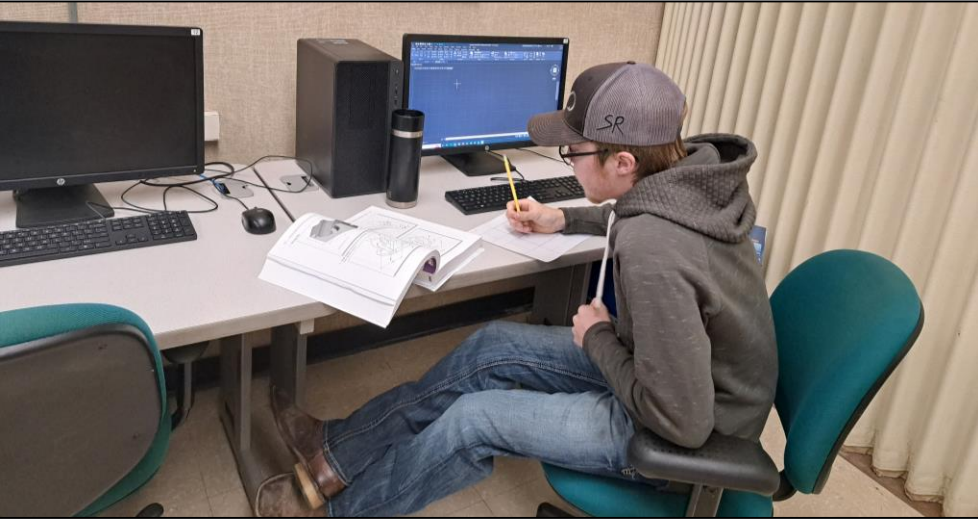

Program acceptance

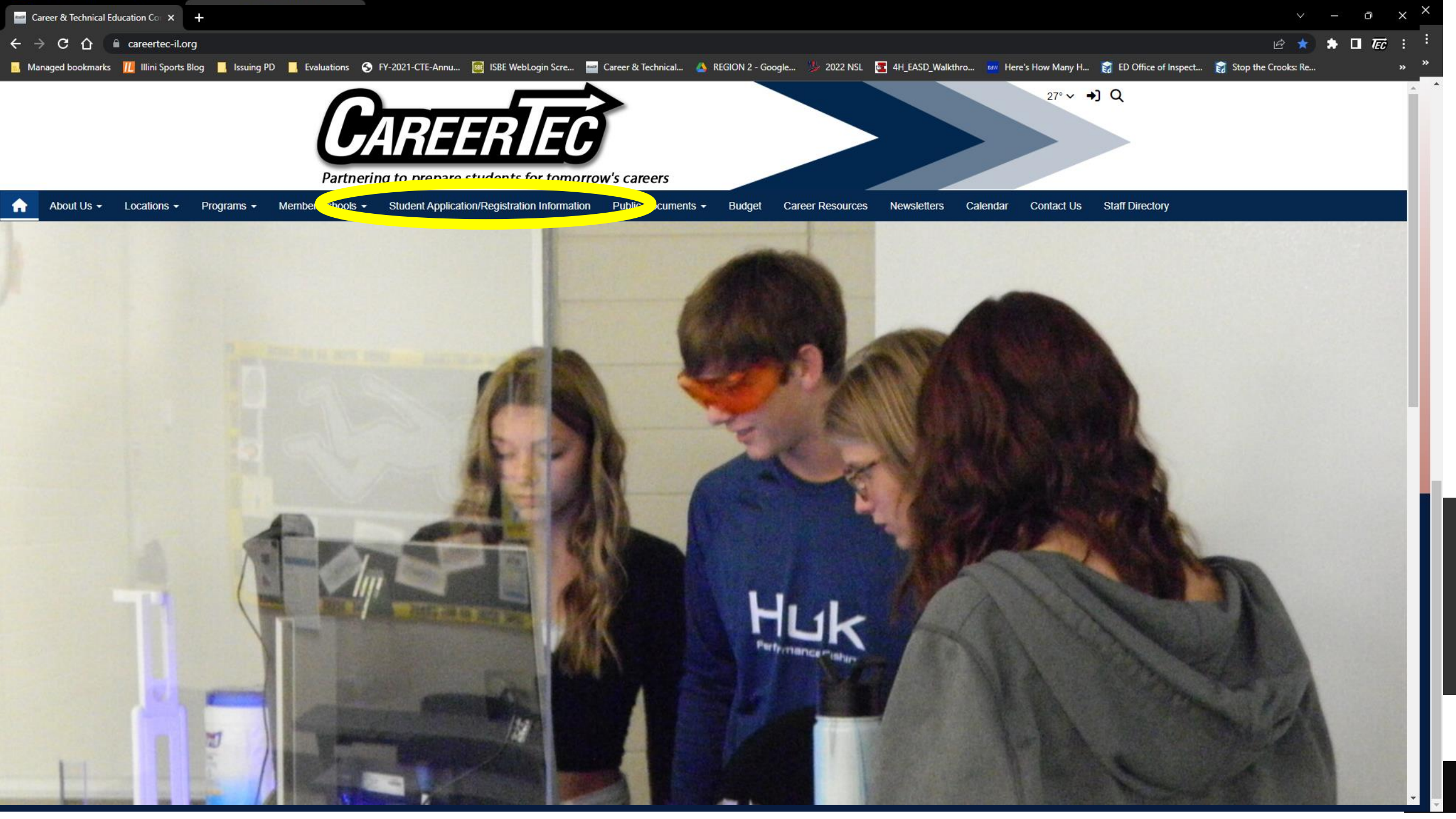
- Based on student interest, attendance record, instructor interview for some courses (see course offerings guide), and minimum grade point average of 2.0.
- Some classes fill up quickly. Acceptance into programs is based on each school having an opportunity to enroll students in the class and, in some cases, a time stamp is used to determine enrollment.
- Students should be registered by April 1 via new online application to be a guaranteed student. Beyond April 1, seats may be available (if approved). Students will learn the first week in April if they were approved for Ed Career Pathway classes.

Don't have great attendance or GPA?

- Students may be accepted as provisional students *IF* they fail to meet the above criteria but show the potential to meet program expectations
- Provisionally enrolled students will be expected to ...
 - Maintain a C or above in the program
 - Maintain acceptable attendance
 - Less than 4 days for the semester
 - Exhibit behavior appropriate (no discipline referrals)
 - A review will be done following the first quarter to determine your status in the class.

Expectations

- Attendance is critical in the work world (and in education). You will be removed from CareerTEC if you do not follow the attendance guidelines (regular students can miss up to 9 days, regardless of the reason)
- Community service is also important to our programs (e.g. Paint the Port, blood drives, ringing bells for Salvation Army, etc).
